The Magazine 10 Years Ago

The WACAP Activities Group organised a Boxing Day walk. 36 villagers and friends completed the walk on a glorious winter's day, raising £40 which was donated to Larkrise Community Farm.

Parish Council Matters - The planning application by Ashford Homes for the Manor Farm development (now Shepherds Drove) was refused mainly because only six affordable homes were planned. District Councillors were pushing to increase the number of affordable homes in the district

and considered that the six that were offered was nowhere near enough. The Westbury Bypass was rejected by the Government, but it was expected that WCC would still press ahead for planning permission. The Parish Council did not favour the eastern route which was chosen because it was the cheapest alternative. Dog fouling continued to be a problem.

The Ladybirds skittles team was promoted to Division One.

Parish Council Matters

Welcome to Nicola Duke who has taken over from Carol Hackett as the Parish Council clerk.

Nicola has had several years in the role of clerk and brings us her experience, which will be invaluable over the coming years.

1. Website

1.1 I'm pleased to say the West Ashton website is now up and running and I hope you agree with me that it looks much more up to date <http://www.westashton.org.uk/> Thank you to Tim for his resolve in updating and make the site more user friendly. Please take a look and if you have any comments or wish to add to the list of events or activities please let me know.

2. Planning

2.1 The Core Strategy is about to pass its final hurdle. Having been endorsed by Wiltshire Council's cabinet, it now just needs full council to approve it on the 20th January 2015.

2.2 Wind Farm – No further news on Grange Farm or Thoulstone but the additional guidance as referenced in the Core Strategy (para 6.38) will be formulated in due course. However this is not guaranteed before the General Election.

2.3 Keevil Airfield Development (Wind Farm) – Planned military flying times at Keevil airfield are published on the RAF Brize Norton website and can be accessed

via the home page,

<http://www.raf.mod.uk/rafbrizenorton> and then by following the quick link labelled 'LAF Times – Keevil' located in the Local Area Flying (LAF) section. Alternatively the following link will take you directly to the relevant page 'Keevil Local Area Flying'.

2.4 Parish Boundary – representatives of the parish council attended the governance review in Trowbridge last December. Consultation is due to start soon, and hopefully the boundaries will remain relatively unaltered, which will mean additional responsibilities in the coming years for the parish council.

2.5 Mick Latham (Selwood Housing) reported that he had contacted residents to address their concerns about the design of the two proposed houses in East Town. The parish council also met with residents to discuss any further issues. The development would provide two social housing with the occupation limited to those who had a connection with the village. The area would be properly established with tarmac and generally tidied up. The parish council has been kept informed and supports this development for local use.

3. Other Matters

3.1 Parking – There was a meeting at the school for villagers to discuss the issues arising from inconsiderate parking and speeding through the village. The parish council will be considering options in due

course to try and alleviate these where possible and funds permitting. One option is to introduce 'Traffic Orders' for the zigzag lines and disabled bay at the school to enable the enforcement of infringements.

3.2 Dog Fouling – Is still an issue, which it appears some residents seem intent on ignoring their responsibilities and persist in walking their dogs and allowing them to foul the footpaths. We all live in the village and it is extremely unpleasant for all, particularly where parents park their cars to take children to school. If anyone sees this happening please report it to PC Mark Hough.

3.3 Field behind the houses - I'm sure you recall the emergency meeting last year about the field east of Bratton Road. Whilst some considerable time has passed, I'm pleased to say contracts have been exchanged, and with a little more negotiation, residents backing onto the field will be assured there won't be any undesired development. Thank you to everyone who offered a donation at the time, which has fortunately proved to be unnecessary and of course Nick and Tim, 'The Builders'. They have facilitated the whole process and managed the arrangements between themselves and the residents.

3.4 Recreation area – The large five-bar gate has been moved to the right and a small pedestrian gate installed. This will enable access from East Town.

3.5 Fly Tipping – Is still a problem from

time to time, but please call Wiltshire Council on 01225 777234 or email clarence@wiltshire.gov.uk if you see any.

3.7 Community Speed Watch (CSW) – This was suspended pending an HSE risk assessment because of new rules. This has now recommenced. Linking this to the parking issues above, the parish council will consider the possibility of traffic calming. On Tuesday 20 January 2015 Community Speed Watch (CSW) volunteers will be carrying out roadside speed checks at 40 locations around Wiltshire and Swindon. Operation Harness is an initiative between the Roads Policing Unit (RPU) and Neighbourhood Policing Teams (NPT) that worked in partnership with CSW. The objective was to educate drivers who were identified as speeding and informing them about speed awareness to help prevent further offences. Police officers will also be taking appropriate measures with any other traffic offences such as, driving while on a mobile phone and not wearing a seatbelt. West Ashton had seven police officers on the day during the CSW session in the afternoon. Media representatives were invited to attend locations where CSW volunteers were carrying out checks.

A Piece of History Comes to St John's Church

Two unique poppies have arrived at St. Johns Church.

They are two of the 888,246 hand made poppies/work of art from London's evocative installation of "Blood Swept Lands and Seas of Red", which marked the centenary of the outbreak of the First World War (1914-2014). The ceramic poppies filled the Tower of London's famous moat from 17 July until Armistice Day on 11th November 2014. Each poppy represented a British or Colonial military fatality during the war. Hundreds of thousands of visitors came to view the sea of red grow, encircling the iconic landmark. Millions more around the world watched on line and shared the experience. 25,000 volunteers generously gave their time to plant the poppies; they came from all over the UK, Europe and the world, including New Zealand, India, China and the USA. Each poppy was sold and monies raised went to six charities: The Confederation of Service Charities; Combat Stress (mental health charity); Coming Home (support for seriously injured service men and women); Help the Heroes (charity providing help and support); The British Legion Admiral Nursing Service (a community dementia nursing service and support to family carers); Soldiers, Sailors, Airmen and Families Association (A most innovative military charity helping to provide support to wives and children of the military personnel).

Two men had the brain wave to create such a beautiful and symbolic memorial which would be remembered for many generations.



Paul Cummins, an international ceramic artist had the concept basing his desire to commemorate the First World War centenary by creating an unforgettable visual installation for all to see, and raise monies for the six service charities at the same time. He certainly achieved his aim. The poppies were made in

Derby and not one flower in the entire manufacture is the same because they were all hand-made, so extra special. Tom Piper (an Olivier Award winning theatre designer) had the idea for the poppies to be like water or blood, seeping from the tower crashing over in waves and filling the moat. His vision was amazing. Ian and I had the privilege to visit this beautifully poignant, yet sad memorial - it was hard to grasp that one poppy was one life. Thousands of people were there but there was an air of serenity and dignity, making the experience very humbling and heart warming. We left feeling we had experienced a very moving tribute. In the Tower of London itself, they had a superb display of photographs and historic detail concerning WW1 - it was amazing (and rather saddening) to see a photograph of a 100 years ago, showing city workers being sworn into the Army in the Tower of London moat (exactly where the poppies had been placed). These proud men formed the Stockbrokers Battalion in 1914.

Mothers Union Banner Has a New Home

The Mothers Union banner is estimated to be over fifty years old and has spent many years on display in the children's corner in St John's Church, West Ashton. 2014 saw this fragile painted linen banner, depicting the Virgin and Child with a kneeling angel in each corner, requiring a much needed restoration plan. This was carried out by a specialist textile conservation firm in Bristol. The renovation took four months, and a grant had been obtained from the Church Conservation/Care Organisation in London. On the banner's return, the restoration specialists suggested that the banner could be placed on its standing pole as it was in the first instance but recommended that it be encased in a frame to help prolong its life and future legacy to the fabric of the Church. After much discussion on this subject, the Church PCC decided to obtain quotes for a suitable framed cabinet to accommodate the recommendations of the restorers. December 2014 saw the completion of this work and the framed banner is now on show at the west end of the church to the right of the organ. The



frame proved to be slightly tricky, due to size and weight of the wooden structure; it is secured to a metal cabinet for stability. The PCC wishes to thank Ron Pybus for his time and expertise in making this frame. The end result has been welcomed and fits into the décor of the Church very well and if anything, enhances the overall appearance of the banner.

Thinking of travelling by Train?

The current electrification of the Great Western Mainline from London Paddington to Bristol Temple Meads is the largest project since the war. It is due to reach the Wiltshire area during July and August this summer, causing major disruptions to all services operating through Trowbridge and Westbury. Full details are still being worked out but many services will be replaced by buses which will inevitably mean longer journey times and probably poor connectivity with onward services. The section of the mainline most affected will be from Chippenham to Bath, which will be closed in two stages. Stage 1 is presently planned for the 18th July to the 31st July and will mean severe disruption of the line from Chippenham to Bath whilst electric cables are strung through Box tunnel. Therefore travelling to London via Bath, the route used at the moment, will be via Bath, Bristol Temple Meads, Bristol Parkway and the South Wales mainline, via Swindon, to reach London or an hourly service from Bath to Chippenham by an alternative route and then onwards to London. During Stage 1 the current Bristol to Waterloo service, three trains per day, should run as timetabled, as will the Portsmouth to Cardiff, but with some possible delays. Westbury to Bath should be a near normal timetable. Westbury to London



Paddington should not be affected to any great extent either. The TransWilts Line via Melksham/Chippenham to Swindon will be operated by buses. The Hearts of Wessex line connecting Bristol via Trowbridge and Westbury to Weymouth will also continue during this period but with

some inevitable disruption. During Stage 2, from 1st to 31st August, the Avon Valley line, connecting Westbury to Bath, will be closed entirely. Replacement buses will operate to the stations from Westbury to Bath along that line. Westbury to Cardiff trains after Trowbridge will be diverted to Swindon, with alternate trains calling at Melksham. The Bristol to Waterloo service will not run during August but may start from Westbury. This has yet to be determined. All of this is yet to be worked out in detail, but please be warned of considerable disruption from July 18th to August 31st, especially if you are expecting to book rail journeys connecting with holiday flights. I would not want you to miss your suntan! As details become clearer, look out for the actual running times and don't be caught out! More information will be provided as it becomes available.

Spotlight on - Warren Berry

Warren is a relative newcomer to the village, moving here with Hazel his wife about a year ago. Born in Goodwick, Pembrokeshire, he left grammar school to serve a five year apprenticeship in marine engineering, followed by a period as a ships engineer in the merchant navy. Taking on work on shore once again, he was involved in production engineering and work study. Public sector management consultancy then followed in a number of local authorities including Wiltshire County Council, where he was employed when he took early retirement, and subsequently resumed his academic studies.

With a master's degree in naval history under his belt and a lifetime interest in all things maritime, Warren started to look around for some voluntary research work. Consequently he became involved with the Kennet and Avon Canal Trust at Devizes, working at improving the records system in the Trust's museum on Devizes wharf, taking on the position of museum curator for around five years. During this time he was asked by a publisher to write a new history of the Kennet and Avon navigation system. This was an important trading waterway in the days before railways and efficient road networks, as it stretched across England from Bristol to Reading, and thence via the Thames to London. The Kennet and Avon was a barge navigation, and the Trust museum at Devizes has on exhibit a large scale model of the Kennet barge *Harriet*, built



by Warren from the “lines” and other measurements he took of the actual *Harriet*, the remains of which are beached on the banks of the river Severn at Purton to slow down bank erosion. On viewing the model, a local narrow boat owner told Warren he intended building a steel hulled replica of a Kennet barge with a view to living aboard and, cruising the navigation in her. Warren's research and the plans he developed to build the model enabled the 72-foot replica to be built. The replica was named *Unity* after another famous Kennet barge that traded along the K&A in its heyday, although instead of a deep and cavernous hold, this *Unity* was fitted out to provide quite palatial accommodation for the owner

and his family.

Warren decided to leave the museum to write another book. As his masters dissertation was based on technical change in the Royal Navy, he decided to use this as a basis for the new book, *The Pre-dreadnought Revolution – Developing the Bulwarks of Sea Power*, which was published in 2013. A keen student of all things maritime, Warren intends to write another book, but this time will concentrate on the history of the 18th and 19th century trade in fresh fruit from the European continent and the opium trade to China, both of which involved fast schooners and other small ships.

Wife Hazel's first language is Welsh, she only learnt English when starting school at five years old. Wanting a spacious bungalow instead of the house in which they lived, Hazel and Warren moved to Bratton Road from North Bradley. As Warren says, West Ashton has many pros and a few cons, most of which are associated with the problems of parking at certain times on the road, and the speed and frequency of passing traffic. They both like the open spaces surrounding their bungalow and the village, and are more than impressed by their friendly and welcoming neighbours.
